Do You Have a Tax-Smart Withdrawal Strategy?

Your plan for drawing down retirement assets could be just as important as your approach to accumulating retirement savings. Experts recommend various methods, such as the so-called 4% rule – withdrawing 4% of your nest egg each year (with adjustments for inflation) – or a three-part system dividing your assets into buckets for short-term, mid-term, and long-term retirement needs.



Before you make any final decisions, it would be wise to consider the tax consequences of your withdrawal strategy. This could be especially tricky if you have multiple accounts subject to different tax treatments. Among the questions you might ask are: (1) Do you want to pay taxes now or later? (2) Should you keep certain funds pursuing growth as long as possible? (3) Could taxable distributions push you into a higher tax bracket or affect the taxability of your Social Security benefits?

HERE ARE SOME GUIDELINES ON THE TAX IMPLICATIONS OF VARIOUS TYPES OF ACCOUNTS:

Taxable accounts such as savings accounts, certificates of deposit (CDs), and investment accounts offer no special tax benefit for keeping funds in the account. Although interest and dividends are taxed annually, withdrawals are typically not subject to ordinary income taxes. However, if you sell appreciated assets such as stock, they may be subject to capital gains taxes, which are generally lower than ordinary income tax rates but could still have a significant impact on your tax liability. There may be fees for certain withdrawals, such as early withdrawals from a CD.

Nonqualified annuities – annuities that are not held in an IRA or a qualified plan such as a 401(k) – are generally purchased with aftertax money. As such, only the earnings portion of annuity withdrawals is taxed as ordinary income. There are two ways to take money out of a nonqualified annuity: regular withdrawals and annuitized payouts. Regular withdrawals are taxed as earnings first, principal second (unless the contract was issued before August 14, 1982). With an annuitized contract, the earnings portion of each payout is taxed as ordinary income.

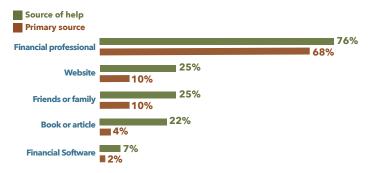
Tax-deferred retirement accounts such as traditional IRAs and 401(k) plans continue to accumulate tax deferred, even if you are no longer contributing to them. Because withdrawals are fully taxable as ordinary income, you might want to extend their potential for growth and defer taxes until later in retirement. Keep in mind that you must begin taking required minimum distributions (RMDs) from tax-deferred accounts when you reach age 72 (70½ if born before July 1, 1949). Once you reach RMD age, you might think of your RMDs as a "baseline" for income from your investment accounts and then look at the potential tax consequences of taking additional withdrawals from that account or other accounts.

Roth accounts include Roth IRAs and Roth 401(k)s. Qualified Roth distributions are not subject to federal income tax, and original owners of Roth IRAs are not subject to RMDs [Roth 401(k)s are subject to RMDs, and inherited retirement accounts have different distribution rules]. To be considered "qualified," a distribution must meet a five-year holding requirement and take place after age 59½, with certain exceptions. Because distributions are tax-free and don't affect your income tax liability, you might decide to take Roth distributions early or later in retirement, depending on your tax situation. In either case, a Roth account provides flexibility to take withdrawals when you want or need them, or to keep funds pursuing growth for later withdrawals and/or to leave a legacy for your heirs.

GETTING HELP

Nearly 7 out of 10 owners of traditional IRAs say they have a strategy for managing income and assets in retirement. Most of them get help from a financial professional.

Early distributions from all tax-advantaged plans prior to age 59½ may be subject to a 10% federal income tax penalty, although there are some exceptions. The Healthiest Water in the World!

t's no secret that water does a body good. But water that's free of contaminants? That's essential for good health. To obtain the best quality water in your home, insist on dual ultra-filtration. Geers Plumbing has been servicing Huntington Beach since the late 1930s and from our current location since 1958. We recommend installing the Tyent water ionization system, which is available in countertop, under-counter, and portable units.



What Is a Water Ionizing System?

Water ionizing machines calibrate the pH level of regular tap water in order to make it more alkaline or acidic. They attach to a facet and transform the tap water through electrolysis. As Tyent explains it, an electrical current is passed through your tap water, splitting it into hydrogen and oxygen particles. The water ionizer then siphons those particles off to keep them separate. Alkaline water is formed by the increased levels of negatively charged ions. Acidic water is formed by the positively charged ions.

Alkaline water (which has a neutral pH level of 7) is recommended for drinking, taking medications, making baby

formula, washing your vegetables, and more. However, acidic water is useful for household disinfecting and can also be used as natural skin cleanser, hair revitalizer, or as an antiseptic mouthwash.

Why You Should Go Alkaline

The American diet is already filled with acidic foods. Drinking hydrogen-rich, alkaline water helps to provide balance in your consumption. In turn, improved alkaline levels in your body can help you prevent weight gain and feel less sluggish. Alkaline water also absorbs more quickly, which allows your body to rehydrate better following exercise and without creating bloat. Finally, ionized water contains hydrogenated ions, which reduce oxidative damage to your skin. Many people say that it tastes smoother than regular tap water. 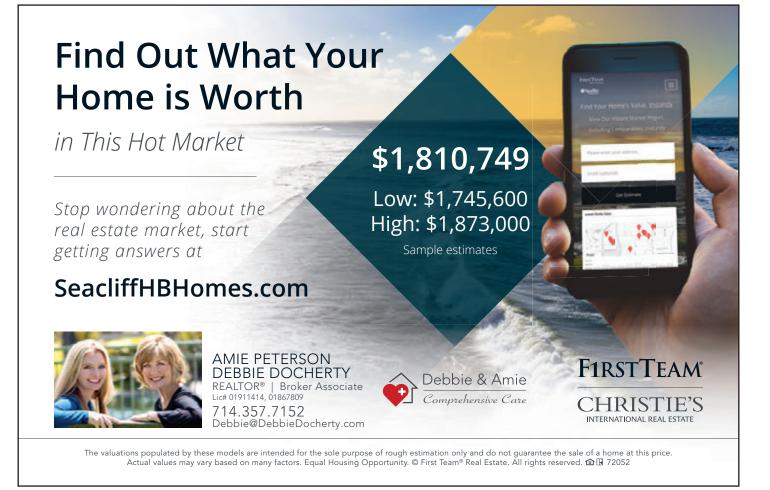
PMMC also reaches about 10,000 children a year through a variety of education programs. As we look to the future, we strive to inspire the next generation of marine biologists, educators, and future ocean

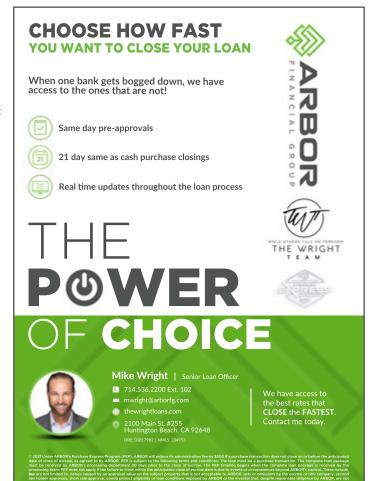
Body: Start a Yoga Practice

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HB JUNIOR LIFEGUARD SIGNUPS: **HAPPENING NOW!**

rowing up in Surf City means that the ocean feels like home. GHowever, being familiar with the sight of the sea, doesn't mean that you're confident swimming in it. The Huntington Beach Fire Department Junior Lifeguard Program seeks to rectify that.

Established in 1964, the world-renowned program runs every summer for seven weeks between June 27 and August 12, and enrollment is happening now. Choose between two sessions: morning (8:30 a.m. to 12 p.m.) or afternoon (1 to 4:30 p.m.). Before- and after-program care and transportation is offered by the Boys and Girls Club of Huntington Valley (visit www.bgchv.com/juniorguard for details).

Participants in Junior Guards are taught respect for the ocean and about its hazardous conditions. They are also taught first aid, CPR, mutual cooperation, competition technique, sportsmanship, and lifesaving methods. Of course, if you've ever seen them practicing at the beach, then you know there's also lots of swimming and running involved!

The kids are divided into three groups: As (ages 14-17, wearing white, pink, or green caps), Bs (ages 12-13, wearing red caps), and Cs (ages 9-11, wearing yellow caps). Participants are then regrouped further based on ability, experience in the ocean and, in the case of the As, desired preference. There is also a Sand Crab division for children ages 7-8.

Enrollees must be between the ages of 9 and 17 (as of July 1), able to swim 100 yards at or under 1:50, able to tread water for 5 minutes, and able to swim under water for 10 yards without coming up for a breath. The Sand Crabs need only to swim 50 yards at or under 1:15, tread water for 2 minutes, and swim under water for 5 yards without needing a breath.

The program's website, www.juniorguard.com, has all the details, but if you're interested, don't wait to check it out. The final tryout date is on Sunday, May 8, at the Golden West College pool.





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One Whale of a Problem

National Endangered Species Day is on May 20th. To honor that, I would like to highlight the fin whale, one of the many cetaceans that are on the endangered species list.

Did you know that whales produce at least half of the oxygen that we breathe? The fin whale, also known as the finback or razorback whale, is the second-longest mammal in the world after the blue whale. Typically, they are found in deep waters of all significant oceans, mainly in temperate to polar areas. Along their back, they have a distinct ridge, which prompted the nickname "razorback."

What makes this type of whale so unique is that the right part of its bottom jaw is bright white and left part jet black. The fin whale weighs almost 80 tons and is 65 to 80 feet in length! This specific species of whale is thought to live for nearly 150 years. Fin whales are also the fastest out of all the great whales, swimming up to 23 miles per hour. Their speed, combined with enormous size, helps them to survive long migration trips between calving grounds in the tropics and feeding grounds near the poles.

Like other large whales, fin whales are at risk for extinction due to environmental changes like climate change, habitat loss, and toxic ocean spills. The reason that whale endangerment is such a pressing issue has to do with the food chain. Because whales are at the top of it, they play a critical role in the health of our oceans by providing nutrients to phytoplankton. Until the last century, they were hunted by commercial whalers for oil, meat, and baleen. Nearly 750,000 animals were killed near the Southern Hemisphere between 1904 and 1979. Today, ocean animals are rarely seen in that area. The fin whales' current status is unknown in most areas outside of the North Atlantic; however, scientists speculate that there are only 50,000 to 90,000 left.

There are many ways that we can do our part to protect all whale species. One way is to stay at least 100 yards away from marine life when you are in the water. Another way is by reporting whales that may appear sick or injured to a marine life organization like The Marine Mammal Center, which helps distressed marine animals. You can also support animals in recovery there by visiting www.marinemammalcenter.org/animal-care/patient-journey/rescue.



The simplest way that we can protect our ocean animals is by reducing ocean pollution. A few things you could switch to are reusable shopping bags, coffee tumblers, water bottles, and more. By saying "no" to disposable plastics and instead utilizing reusable products, we can keep our oceans clean and help protect endangered marine animals, including the fin whale!

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Chicken Enchiladas

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- 1 Zucchini
- 1 Red bell pepper
- 1 Yellow onion
- 1 Jar Frontera tomatillo sauce (Frontera brand has no preservatives and it is sugar-, gluten- and soy-free)
- 1 8-count pack of almond flour tortillas
- 1 Bag shredded Mexican blend cheese
- 1 Packet of taco seasoning •

Instructions:

Boil water and cook chicken breasts until tender and easy to shred (about 25 minutes). Dice the yellow onion, bell pepper, and zucchini and place to the side. In a large mixing bowl, combine the shredded chicken, taco seasoning packet, 1/2 cup shredded cheese, and the diced vegetables. In a medium-sized baking dish, lay four tortillas down to cover the dish. Add the chicken and all ingredients on top and then layer the dish with the other four tortillas. Pour in the tomatillo sauce and top with shredded cheese. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Garnish with cilantro and olives (optional).

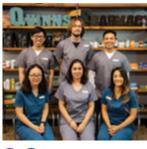

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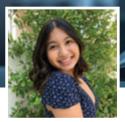
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Library Resources for Teens

The Huntington Beach Public Library (HBPL) is a great place for people of

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all ages, especially teens! Next to the used bookstore is what is known as the Teen Space. It's a designated area for youth in grades 7 to 12 that contains a row of computers for those who would like to work while surrounded by people their age. It also contains young adult fiction and Manga books, making it easy for teens to find what interests them. Besides computers and books, there are also comfortable chairs in the space for those who want to curl up and read or engage in hushed conversation. Along the walls there are outlets, which allow for charging laptops, phones, and other electronic devices.

Another unique aspect of the teen section is that it's decorated in accordance with the historical significance of each month. For example, in March, they had a row of books pertaining to Women's History Month (amongst them "Girlhood" and "The Rebellious Life of Mrs. Rosa Parks"). The library also hosted a "Women In STEAM – Science, Engineering, Art, and Math" panel event, which included highly successful women from a variety of fields who spoke about their careers and answered questions. These events are hosted in the library theater and are open to everyone. There are also ways for teens to give back to the HBPL. Volunteer opportunities include running the Children's Summer Reading Program, shelving books, and becoming a reading buddy to help elementary children with literacy. Additionally, youth can join the Teen Action Group, which creates passion projects (activities and programs that they plan themselves) for the library. The group hosts monthly meetings, and attendees can receive service hours for their participation.

The HBPL provides a wonderful online catalog of available materials that provides an option for filtering by age group. Click on it, and you'll find a slideshow of the "teens' latest reads," which provides people with a way to see what their peers have been reading as inspiration for themselves. Book recommendations range from young fiction to fantasy to non-fiction. They also offer other websites that could appeal to teens including Teen Ink, Teen Reads, and the young adult fiction of Goodreads. There is even an event calendar where people can see what is being offered to teens, including a youth coding class and bullet journaling class.

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Flag Flying Guidance

A re you planning to proudly fly your American flag again this month? Or are you perhaps planning to purchase your first one? There are a few rules to follow in doing so – they're known as the US Flag Code, and they date all the way back to a Congressional resolution made in 1942. Here are just a few of the things to keep in mind.

Watch the clock: All American flags should be displayed from sunrise to sunset every day on flagstaffs in the open, and then taken down as a sign of respect. However, if properly illuminated (meaning a light has been placed specifically for that purpose) at night, your flag can fly all 24 hours.

Keep it left: Whether your flag is hung vertically on a pole or hung against a wall, the Union (or blue section) should be to the observer's left.

Proceed to the right: In a procession, the flag should be to the right of any other flag. Or, if there's a line of flags, it should be given the position of honor: in the front of the center of that line.

Raise it high: If the flag is displayed on a staff projecting from a building, the Union should be at the peak of the staff.

Flatten it out: If not flying from a staff, the flag should be be displayed flat or hung in such a way that the folds fall freely.

Be street smart: Flags flown over a street should be suspended vertically with the union to the north in an east and west street, or to the east in a north and south street.

Watch the eyeline: If displaying a flag on a platform, it should be positioned above and behind the speaker with the Union uppermost and to the observer's left.

Stage it with honor: If your staff-hung flag is in a church or auditorium, it should be placed in the position of honor: to the speaker's right (as they are facing the audience).

Head and shoulders: When draping a casket, the Union should be placed at the head and over the left shoulder.

Watch the weather: Unless your flag is made of nylon or other nonabsorbent material, it should not be flown during inclement weather.

Follow parade propriety: Flags shouldn't be displayed on floats unless hung from a staff. They also shouldn't be draped over the hood, the top, sides, or back of a vehicle. Rather, flags displayed on a vehicle should be hung from a staff that is firmly affixed to the chassis.

Don't get grounded: Your flag should be flown, displayed, and handled in such a way that it never touches the ground or anything beneath it.



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Surf History Explored

Did you know that the Huntington Beach International Surfing Museum was not started by a surfer or even by a resident? Rather, it was created in 1987 by Natalie Kotsch, a Canadian woman who

upon moving to Southern California, discovered quickly that you don't have to be a surfer to enjoy watching the sport.

Ms. Kotsch has made it possible for surfboards and local history to be kept in an extensive, cataloged, and rotating collection for the public to enjoy. Additionally, surfers from more than 42 nations have visited the museum to experience its rich history and find out where some of their favorite locals are catching waves.



Back in the Day

Hawaii-born lifeguard/swimming instructor George Douglas Freeth, Jr., is recognized as the first surfer in the United States. He introduced the sport to Southern California via a demonstration at the dedication of Huntington Beach's 1,350-foot, concrete pier in 1914. However, it did not become a 24-hour activity until the early- to mid-50s, when wet suits became more widely available. In 1991, Congressman Dana Rohrabacher recognized the exclusivity of the Huntington

On May 28, 1994, the world's first and only Surfing Walk of Fame was dedicated in front of an international press audience. Step Inside

The International Surfing Museum is operated as a non-profit organization and is dedicated to preserving the history of surfing culture across the world. It is named after Duke Kahanamoku, the Polynesian giant and Olympic gold medalist who is renowned as the "Father of Modern Surfing" (he also presided over five USA Surfing Championships in HB). The museum features antique surfboards, information about some of surfing's greats, classic surf videos, creative surfing sculptures, and even surf music to enjoy.

Also on display are memorabilia and cultural collections, including some of surfing history's most significant objects like Kahanamoku's surfboard and the world's largest surfboard, which broke the Guinness World Record in 2015 when 66 people rode it in HB's surf. The museum's daily admission fee is only \$2 per person, and annual and lifetime memberships and patronships are also available. Stop by 411 Olive Ave. (at 5th Street) and immerse yourself in Surf City USA culture!

World Surf League Challenger Series Update

Hey surf fans! We've got some great news for you. Following last year's condensed season of the World Surf League (WSL) Challenger Series, 2022 promises a return to normalcy with a full schedule. The Challenger Series, which is known as the "ultimate battleground" for surfers to qualify for a spot in the elite, 2023 Championship Tour



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(CT), includes the popular VANS US Open of Surfing right here in Huntington Beach!

According to the WSL, the competition field will include 96 men and 64 women for most events (made up of 34 men and 17 women from the CT), 58 men and 43 women that are allocated by the WSL regions, and 4 men's and 4 women's wildcards. Any unused CT spots will become wildcards. The last event of the season, the Haleiwa Challenger, will include 80 men and 48 women who will be selected based on their rankings at the time. The action will be broadcast live on WorldSurfLeague.com, the free WSL app, and on the WSL's YouTube channel.

Leptospirosis and Your Dog

Leptospirosis is hard to say, but really easy to catch. That's why it's an important disease to know about, especially if your pet spends any amount of time outdoors. It's caused by the leptospira bacteria that can be found anywhere that wildlife urinates, and that includes your own backyard where opossums, squirrels, raccoons, squirrels, and other rodents may visit. If your dog picks up the bacteria, it can easily be transmitted to you and your family.

Symptoms to look for include fever, vomiting, abdominal pain, diarrhea, lack of appetite, severe weakness and/or muscle pain, stiffness, bleeding, conjunctivitis, acute kidney disfunction, and infertility. After your veterinarian has run tests and confirmed a leptospirosis diagnosis, treatment will likely include antibiotics: usually first intravenously with penicillin derivatives, followed by oral doxycycline once the gastrointestinal symptoms have resolved. It's also important to maintain your dog's hydration and nutrition during treatment.

The prognosis is generally good, with an 80% survival rate post treatment. However, leptospirosis can also be associated with pulmonary hemorrhage syndrome, a more severe situation for which your dog might also require mechanical ventilation or hemodialysis. In those cases, the outlook could be grave.

Fortunately, there's a vaccine available that can decrease your pet's risk of becoming sick from leptospirosis. Be sure to speak with your veterinarian about it.

Grandma Erma has the best sense of humor; she's always smiling, laughing, and having fun. She is also known for being a hard-working woman who held down multiple jobs at the same time, earning what the family needed. Her words of wisdom are something that I've tried to take to heart. She says, "Don't worry or stress, especially if the situation is out of your control. Rather, stay positive and work hard. Things will always work out for the best!"



She practices the golden rule of being kind to others. She also advises minding your own business and never talking bad about others. Erma is someone who believes in always looking ahead – and never behind – because life is about being in the moment, and isn't it so much better looking forward to what tomorrow brings? Her favorite saying is: "Good, better, best... don't let it rest until the good is better and the better is best!"



Back in the Day

Erma grew up on a truck farm with her three sisters and one brother. There was no electricity or running water in their home, so they lit kerosene lamps, pumped water from the well, and utilized a woodburning stove. Their mode of transportation was a horse-drawn wagon.

Every morning, Erma milked two cows before walking 2.5 miles to the one-room schoolhouse where her one teacher taught all of the children kindergarten through 8th grades. After school, she worked on the farm. At the age of 11, Erma was bitten by a copperhead snake during school recess. The teacher cut slits around the bite and Erma's sister, Edna, sucked out the venom. With no medicine to counteract the effects, Erma spent months in bed with a swollen leg, but felt very lucky to survive.

My grandmother got her first job just after finishing 8th grade. She worked as a nanny for two little girls, earning 5 cents per hour. During World War II, she worked on a drill press drilling holes in metal to be used in ships. She held many jobs: working in a knitting mill, catering company, residential and commercial cleaner, at county fairs and Leesport Farmers Market. During the Great Depression, many goods were rationed and people learned to get by without. To this day, Erma never wastes anything nor throws anything away that might still have use. She also remembers living through the Spanish Flu during her childhood. When Covid-19 pandemic hit in 2019, she had invaluable personal perspective to share. She advised, "Don't worry. This, too, will pass, and everything will be back to normal soon."

Erma retired in her mid 70s. She never smoked nor drank alcohol, and she had her last cup of coffee at the age of 40. Her daily intake of carrots, spinach, half of a banana, sit-ups and leg lifts are what she credits to keeping her young, active, and healthy.

Erma Today

The Opis Coquina Center, a nursing home in Ormond Beach, Florida, is where Erma now resides. She loves to feed the ducks and the long-legged ibises on her daily walk to the nearby pond. Her daughter, Sandi, and son, Jon, visit daily and take weekly driving outings to view the beauty of the land. Erma is amazed by how Facebook works and enjoys hearing comments from people she has never met! The advice that she often shares is "laughter



is the best medicine" and "make the best of each day." Erma's favorite television show is the GOLDEN GIRLS. I'm pretty sure this grand lady would have fit right in.
